I want to thank Mike Armstrong for another great clinic. I know many of us are reluctant to do much scenery on our layout. Using some of Mike's methods you no longer have a reason to put it off!

Our visit to Wendell Greer's layout was a treat that I look forward to each year. It is great fun to see what he has added and/or improved on his railroad. There is always a lot to learn from a Master Model Railroader and Wendell is one who is constantly willing to share his tricks and secrets. I want to thank both Mike and Wendell for making our February meeting such a success.

In March our clinic will be presented by Pete Birdsong. He will host a discussion on model railroad workshops, work benches, and favorite tools. This should prove to be a lively clinic and will be a lot of fun.

Our tour this month will be to Pat Gerstle's Sn3 Layout. It is a freelance section of the famous D&RGW railroad. This is without a doubt one of the most impressive small layouts in the state of Kentucky. Pat has gone to unprecedented lengths to create an accurate scenic setting for his railroad. If you take the time to visit any layouts this year, this one should be at the top of your list.

Modeling Tips: A Different Approach II

Before I go any further, there is a need to clarify and make a slight change. The first article written in the last issue is to be titled: Modeling Tips: A Different Approach I and let this one be section II. In a nutshell, the last issue dealt with the rationale of modeling tips, the raw materials (wood, plastic and metal) that can be available.

Part A: Mechanics in dealing with the raw materials

There has to be ways of forming the shapes, scale sizes, and the needed quantities of wood, plastic and metal. Certain tools are needed to cut, saw, whittle, plane, laminate, glue, paint and weather the parts we wish to add on or show. Here are some examples:

- 1) hobby knives with handles and blades of various numbers and sizes. These knives are used to shape parts for proper scale size, length, width, depth, curves and any form needed. Also, don't forget the pocket knife.
- 2) surfoam rasps, files, and small planes. These tools are great for making smooth surfaces and for reducing thickness of the material.
- 3) razor saws, fine-toothed saws, backsaws, dovetail saws, hacksaws with fine-toothed (straight) blades. A specific saw can be used for special cuts for wood, plastic or metal. Even the carpenter's saw can come in handy to saw larger pieces smaller.
- 4) sharpening stones for knives. In order to be effective in cutting, knife blades are sharpened for easier cutting and carving. But for replaceable blades, it is better to buy new blades in the run...saves time and prevent accidents from dull ones.
- 5) single-edged razor blades. These are nice for short, thin strokes on wood or plastic. But I do not recommend razor blades (especially the double-edged ones); it is better to use a hobby knife. You can have more control with such cutting tool with a long handle than razor blades. These blades are fine for purchased "choppers" which some model builders use and are careful how they cut their materials.
- 6) medium- and small-size crowbars and hammer. These are handy to knock down nailed wooden crates and boxes for the wood.
- 7) scale ruler, straight-edge (of brass or iron metal so as not disfigure your scale ruler when cutting), and sharpened pencils.
- 8) miter box and home-made helping jigs.
- 9) small- and medium-sized clamps.
- 10) fine-grit sandpaper and a sandpaper holder.

These are the basics to have handy as a start. We will deal more along this line later on when we can make a list of what we need in modeling and build up ideas for the modeling tips.

Part B: Safety This particular area can never be overemphasized. Watch where you place your hands, and fingers (and even feet) on wood, plastic and even the tool before you cut or saw. Even too much pressure or improper use of a tool can lead to accidental skin and flesh wounds, even an eye injury. (I have a long scar on my left fourth finger with a cut from a razor blade while building an airplane model. I also have a cut in a leather shoe when I dropped a hobby knife. Speak about "practicing what one preaches!")

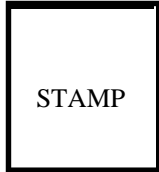
