March Division 10 Diorama Program

I want to thank each of the seven members who entered a diorama in the program. I hope you all had fun and learned from the process. Every entry was freelanced and all showed a great deal of creativity. If you didn't have an entry in this program please consider building one the next time we have the program. You will develop several different modeling skills that will improve existing layouts or help you when you start detailing your first layout. One of the first things the judges looked for as they judged the diorama was "does it look real?" The judges were Pete Birdsong, Larry Smith and me. A modified AP type form was used to judge each entry with a total of 100 points possible.

It was a very close contest with only an eight point difference between the first place winner and fourth place. Here are the results.

1. Bill Paulsell earned 83 points. Bill had a very large diorama with an interesting road design. He had lots of telephone poles and multiple structures including a very nice scratch built four story warehouse.
2. Pete Birdsong earned 79 points. Pete built an abandoned railroad facility with scratch built turnouts, rails being pulled up, multiple structures, vehicles and people. It looked very scruffy which is exactly the way it was supposed to look. It's difficult to do scruffy well and Pete did it beautifully. .
3. Lou Jaquith earned 78 points. Lou built an excellent propane facility with a beautiful scratch built chain link fence. The hinges on the gate were functional and the propane tank on a delivery truck was also scratch built using a cigar tube. As usual Lou's ballasting of his road bed was flawless. Witless & Clueless

- Rivets: Another project?
- Larry: Nope. Just science. I read an editorial in *O Gauge Railroading* the other day. The editor was saying how amused he was that people keep trying to find ways to lessen the sound of the moving trains. Some people say they can't even hear their sound decoders for the noise.
- Rivets: Did they remember to put speakers in the tenders after they installed the decoders?
- Larry: Rivets, one time I do somethin' stupid and you never let me forget it!
- Rivets: One time!?
- Larry: Any way, I have been experimentin' with ways to deaden the sound from the mettles wheels on the track. I have found perfect solution...air!!
- Rivets: Air? Now your not makin' any sense.
- Larry: All right, Rivets, Stay with me here. Most track noise is amplified by some hard connection of the track to the table or bench work. I figure if I can get air between the track and the sub road bed surface, I could significantly lower the noise level.
- Rivets: You're talkin' like a scientist, but you still sound like Larry. So how do you use "air"?
- Larry: Well, the problem isn't solved, but I am still in the experimental stage. For example, I built a small circular table with track and tried putting the bubble wrap with the small bubbles under the track and roadbed. That didn't work because the heavier engines popped the air pockets. It sounded like a popcorn train. I knew that wouldn't work.
- Rivets: I could have told ya that was a bad idea.
- Larry: Yeah, but now I've 'liminated one possibility. Next I tried the bubble wrap with the large air pockets. Goin' around curves, the engines and trains would rock and something would get caught on the plastic. Boy, was that a mess!
- Rivets: Larry, don't you have any *real* ideas?
- Larry: Well, there is this one I got from watching a couple of guys playin' air hockey. I built a wall from styrene, 'bout an inch high, on both sides of the track. It formed a kind o' trough. I drilled a whole bunch of holes in the trough. Then I put tape on the bottom side of the track, and hooked up my air compressor...the big one.
- I thought if I could float the track there would be no noise.
- Rivets: An air compressor, Larry?
- Larry: In theory it ought to work.
- Rivets: I have a theory about your theory. I think...
- Larry: When I applied 250 psi, the track went up like I had planned, and up and up like a rocket.
- Rivets: 250 psi!?
- Larry: Yeah. A little too much pressure, but I was able to catch my 4-6-2 on the way down from the ceiling...a one handed grab, tender and locomotive at the same time.

NMRA's 75th Anniversary Photography Contest

Win a cab ride in a Union Pacific steam locomotive! The National Model Railroad Association and the Union Pacific Railroad are pleased to announce a model photography contest to help celebrate the 75th anniversary of the NMRA. The NMRA will pick one photograph submitted by an NMRA member in good standing depicting one or more models of UP equipment and/or structures in a realistic scene. The photograph will be judged for prototype fidelity of the modeling and scene as well as for photographic art.

The member submitting the photograph will win a cab ride in one of the mainline steam locomotives operated by the Union Pacific on the Kansas City to Jefferson City leg of the Missouri River Eagle Excursion. Airfare (up to \$500.00), two hotel nights, and transportation to and from the excursion will be provided for the winner by the NMRA.

To be eligible, the photograph must be in an envelope postmarked (or originated in transit by a third-party service such as FedEx or UPS) by August 31, 2010, and received no later than September 7, 2010. Only one photograph may be submitted per envelope, but there is no limit on the number of photographs a member may submit. Photographic prints, slides, or digital images are acceptable. Prints must be 8" x 10." Digital images must be taken with a camera of 7.1 megapixels or greater to satisfy the printing requirements. All submitted photographs shall become the property of the NMRA, and the NMRA and Union Pacific may use the photograph in any manner they choose. All members participating in the contest agree to provide to the NMRA the original medium of the photograph (negative, transparency, or digital file) if requested.
